Salt Lake Acting Company Celebrates the Holiday Season With Its 7th Annual Children's Musical:

ART DOG

By John Olive Music by Susan Ennis Based on the Book by Thacher Hurd

As the first snow of the season begins to fall, Salt Lake Acting Company (SLAC) is preparing for the most wonderful time of the year. From **December 4 through December 23, 2015**, the SLAC lobby will be filled to the brim with artwork from the young artists of Bad Dog Arts and the theatre rumbling with thrilled young voices chattering excitedly as they await the opening music of **ART DOG**. This year marks SLAC's seventh year producing professional plays for children (of all ages), and of partnering with local schools and organizations that serve the needs of children in the community.

Based on the colorful book by Thacher Hurd, the musical version of ART DOG is written by John Olive (book) and Susan Ennis (music). By day, Arthur Dog is a mild-mannered museum guard; by night, he is Art Dog – a mysterious artist who makes the city his canvas. However, when Leonardo Dog Vinci's Mona Woofa goes missing from the Dogopolis Museum of Art, Art Dog is a prime suspect.

Returning again this year is director Penelope Caywood who has directed six of SLAC's seven children's plays. She has worked as Artistic Director for Youth Theatre at the U for the past nine years and is excited to tackle ART DOG.

Caywood says, "ART DOG is doggone fun! The idea of a hero who uses painting instead of punches to win the day is a brush stroke of genius. It makes me wish I'd written it. So I feel really lucky that at least I get to direct it."

One of the most rewarding aspects of producing children's theatre for Salt Lake Acting Company is its **Title 1 Matinee Arts Education Program**, which allows over 1,700 underprivileged schoolchildren to experience the magic of live theatre at no cost to them or their schools. With arts education receiving less and less attention and funding, this program plays a vital role in providing a more well-rounded education to Utah students. Every children's play that SLAC produces is based on a literary work. SLAC creates a study guide to accompany each play and distributes it to every class that attends the Title 1 Matinee program. The guide includes learning activities to be completed before and after the children see the play, reinforcing the connection between literacy and the arts. Kelley Morgan, a kindergarten teacher at Franklin Elementary (a Title 1 school) said of SLAC's Title 1 Matinee program, "Our students have little opportunity to see live performances. Not only is the opportunity mazing, it is always the favorite field trip of the year."

Also during this time of year, SLAC bolsters its commitment to enrich and engage community by partnering with several local organizations. SLAC has developed a special relationship with Intermountain Therapy Animals (ITA), a non-profit organization that brings animal resources to human needs in the areas of physical, occupational, speech, and psychotherapies, as well as special education. ITA launched its R.E.A.D. program in 1999 – the first comprehensive literacy program built around the appealing idea of reading to dogs. During the run of ART DOG, SLAC will host volunteers from ITA along with their furry friends in the lobby to raise awareness and money for the organization.

SLAC is also partnering with Voices for Utah Children, a multi-issue child advocacy organization that works to make Utah a place where all children thrive. They will be joining SLAC for a special performance of ART DOG.

And finally, SLAC will be partnering with Bad Dog Arts. Bad Dog Arts (BDA) strives to inspire kids, teens, and adults from all cultures to experience the power and freedom to imagine, dare, and create new possibilities, individually and collaboratively, through the creative arts. BDA is an artist run non-profit arts organization located in downtown Salt Lake City that fills the need for a safe space for at-risk youth in the community ages 5-18. At Bad Dog Arts, students can engage in confidence-building and highly creative activities in the studio, in the classroom, and out in the community. BDA uses art as a means to mentor at-risk youth through a process of personal development that strengthens confidence, core values, and critical life skills.

Bad Dog Arts is requesting donations to sustain their tuition waiver scholarships to children from low-income families as well as donations of materials such as buttons, beads, colored plastic bottle caps and costume jewelry for multimedia projects. SLAC will be collecting these donations in the lobby throughout the run of ART DOG.

SLAC is thrilled to welcome the holiday season and with it, the magic of children's theatre. ART DOG is sure to delight audiences of all ages.

DIRECTOR

Penelope Caywood returns to direct her fifth children's production at SLAC. Penny started acting at the age of five. Her first role was the Shy Princess in THE KING AND I, she still has the costume to prove it. Her career started early, but her talents were not limited to the stage. She traveled across the country with a youth singing group—The LaMarca American Variety Singers. She sang on children's records, attended math school in Japan, took jazz and tap, played the flute and participated in speech contests. When she was 19, Penny was involved in the creation of a youth theatre company in Palos Verdes, CA called Curtains Up! Locally Penny is best known for her work with the University of Utah's Youth Theatre where she has been the director for the past seven years. She has directed every U Youth Theatre production and is responsible for educational and outreach programming too. Penny has directed at Rogers Memorial Theatre and SLAC.

MUSIC DIRECTOR

Kevin Mathie is pleased to be back at SLAC after working on his 11th year with SATURDAY'S VOYEUR. His recent directing and conducting credits include the U.S. Premier of Monty Python's new show NOT THE MESSIAH, ALWAYS...PATSY CLINE, FOREVER PLAID, and INTO THE WOODS, only to name a few. As a composer for theatre, Kevin has produced complete original vocal scores for SHEAR LUCK (book/lyrics by Brenda Cowley), RUMPELSTILTSKIN (book/lyrics by Dana Keiter), JACK AND THE BEANSTALK (book/lyrics by Dana Keiter), and Intermountain Health Care's LIVE WELL (co-written with Eric Jensen and Robin Wilks-Dunn) that tours schools throughout Utah.
